When It Comes To Cutting Government Waste, There's No Free Lunch

The Osgood File. I'm Charles Osgood.

President Clinton wants us to write him or Vice President Gore, and for the price of a postage stamp, we can tell him any ideas we have about how the government should be changed. Or to use the toll free 1-800 numbers that various government agencies have set up. You can call the Treasury Department, for example, at 1-800-359-3898 and give them your financial and fiscal ideas. The fact that these are toll-free calls doesn't mean that they're free. It only means that the caller doesn't have to pay. Somebody does have to pay.

One of our serious problems in this country is that the public has been conditioned to think that when the government does something for them for no charge, it is free. It is not free. We are never going to solve the deficit and debt problem unless everybody in the government from President Clinton on down stops perpetuating the fiction that anything the government does for us is free.

Nothing is free. If you write your suggestions to the U.S. government, Vice President Gore says mark the envelope re-inventing government. And cabinet members are being asked to dedicate five to ten of the best employees they have to opening, reading and dealing with this mail. So it's not just the cost of the postage stamp, is it? It's also the cost of the five or ten employees in each department. We're already talking about hundreds of people. Nothing is free, in Washington or anywhere else.

Let's say you call the Pentagon's toll free number, 1-800-424-9121. They've had this so-called hot line there since 1979. Last year it received about 15,000 calls at a cost of \$1.2 million. That works out to \$80 a call. Tell me, is a call that costs \$80 a free call? Of course it isn't. No doubt, some excellent suggestions come in on 800 lines. It might make the government more efficient and may even save money. I'm not saying don't do this, I'm just saying the public should understand that it is not free. When we get something and somebody else pays, whether it's Uncle Sam, or the city, or an insurance company, or whoever it is, it is not free. There is no such thing as free lunch or breakfast or dinner. There is no free housing. There is no free medical care. And there never will be. And the more we think of these things as free, the more it's going to cost us.
